Choosing Goals

When it comes to choosing life-goals we have some wonderful examples. When Jesus stood before Pilate, the Roman governor, he answered one of Pilate's questions with the statement, "To this end I was born, and for this cause came I into the world" (John 18:37). It is very obvious that Jesus had a clear sense of purpose. He never did or said anything that did not fit exactly into the purpose for which he came into the world. Later, in his own adulthood he spoke of himself, saying, "The Son of man came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10). He knew why he came and he never forgot it for a moment.

The apostle Paul is another outstanding example of a goal-directed life. His book of Philippians, one of my favorites in the New Testament, was written from a Roman prison where he faced the very real possibility of death. Yet, in that book he wrote, "I have learned, in whatever state I am, to be content." He went on to explain, "I know how to be abased, and I know how to abound; in any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and want" (Philippians 4:11, 12).

In an earlier chapter in that same book he stated the reason why he could be content under any circumstances. He wrote, "Indeed I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as refuse, in order that I may gain Christ...Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brethren, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but one thing I do, forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:8, 12-14). There is no question but that Paul knew where he want to go and was dedicated totally to going there.

Goals, when they are concrete and real, especially when they are high-purposed, can lift a life from being ordinary to being great.

When someone is thinking about the ultimate purposes of life, the best advice that I know to give is that he center his life in Jesus Christ. As he makes a deep commitment to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord, his life begins to move upward to the limits of meaningfulness. The need for such a commitment is urgent and must not be delayed. Life is fleeting and until it is centered in Christ it is without its highest purpose and destiny.
